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2008 Award Winners

Co-Female Athletes of the Year

Katie Coronado - UNM Track - Javelin

2008 was a year Katie will never forget. First she wins the Mountain West Javelin championship with a throw of 176.1'. Second she went to the NCAA Outdoor Championship and records a career best throw of 179.6' and placed 2nd.

The Ruidoso product then advanced to the Olympic Trials as a number 6 seed. Her magical season came to an end during the finals of the trials. She placed 6th, with a throw of 174.1'. She was pleasantly surprised when she was asked to represent the USA at the North America, Central America and Caribbean Athletic Association under 23 Track and Field Championships in Toluca, Mexico. Katie finished 3rd with a throw of 162.11'. She was disappointed in her throws, but what a fabulous experience.

Jeanne Fairchild - UNM - Volleyball

Jeanne was an integral part in the Lobos rise from 10 wins in 2006 to 22 wins in 2008. She was named Mountain West Co-Player of the Year.

After leading the MWC and ranking third nationally in kills per set (4.81). She is UNM's only 2 time MWC Player of the year. After her great 2008 season, she was named to the All-West Regional Team, and was named 3rd team All American by the All American Volleyball Coaches Association.

Fairchild's name will adorn a Johnson Center banner that will include UNM's other All American volleyball players, Karen Saavedra-Warnock (1988), Maria Guerrero (1990), Pauline Manser (1990, 1991) and Sharon Browning (1992).

Jeanne has signed a contract in Puerto Rico to play professional volleyball this spring.

Co - Male Athlete of the Year

Joey Hagerty - USA Olympic Gymnastics Team

Joey is a La Cueva graduate and was born in Albuquerque, but grew up in Rio Rancho. He trained at Gold Cup which is close to La Cueva High School and they were willing to work around his gymnastics schedule.

Joey's Olympic dream came true in 2008. This was his first Olympic trials. He had never been to the World Championships either, while 14 of the 15 other competitors had.

To win a medal at the Olympics was going to be hard. Two of the USA's best athletes, Paul and Morgan Hamm, were injured and unable to compete. This meant that the USA would use two alternates.

The team competition was close for the first few events, but the team from China was just too strong. The USA was now competing for the silver medal through the 5th event, but struggled in the floor exercise and pommel horse. In the end, the USA team took the bronze medal.

In February 2009, he will be among 12 Olympians competing in The America's Cup in Suburban Chicago.

During Joey's quest for the Olympics, he had another distraction, one closer to home. His father, Mike, was recovering from a near fatal accident in March of 2008.

Team of the Year

Moriarty High School - Volleyball

During the past 7 seasons as head coach of the Pintos, Bell's teams have qualified for the state tournament 6 times, with 5 district titles, 1 state runner-up, and a regional championship finish. During the last 2 seasons, the Pintos have amassed an overall record of 45-5 winning 2 district and 2 state titles.

Coach Bell was named AAAA Coach of the Year and the Albuquerque Metro Coach of the Year. Her varsity teams had an average GPA of 3.928 during the last 2 seasons. Numerous players have earned district, metro and state individual honors, including 4 players chosen to participate in the North South All Star game. Pinto player, Kristin Valencia, was named AAAA Player of the Year.

This year's championship team was a shining example of the fact that success can come out of a multi-sport environment. All 12 varsity players compete in at least one other sport during the school year while 5 players compete in 3 sports.

Coach of the Year

Gene Victor - Cibola High School - Softball

2008 was a banner year for Gene Victor. He won back to back girls state softball championships in 2007 & 2008. His 2008 team was ranked as high as 11th in the nation and finished the season ranked 14th. He went on to win the New Mexico High School Coaches Association Coach of the Year, as well as the District 1-5A Coach of the Year honors.

In September, he was inducted into the Softball/Baseball Hall of Fame for his many years of playing fast pitch softball and 23 years of coaching girl's softball at Cibola High School. While coaching, he maintained a full time job as an air traffic controller.

Winning 29 games in 2008 and having his star pitcher, Missy Martinez, back for the 2009 season, Cibola should be the favorite going into the season.

Promotion of the Year

The New Mexico Sports Authority and Brian O'Neill Pete Sampras, considered by some tennis experts to be the greatest player ever, came to The Pit for an exhibition match. Sampras, a seven-time Wimbledon champion and holder of a record 14 grand slam tournament singles, played 42nd ranked, 20 year old, US Olympian, Sam Querrey.

The Pit has not been home to a tennis exhibition since the 1980's when Martina Navratilova played an exhibition match with Chris Evert.

It turned out to be a tremendous success for the tennis community, with Sampras winning in 4 sets and exciting the crowd with balls flying into the crowd the whole night.

Special Recognition

Marissa Campbell - Manzano Graduate 2008 - Swimming
During her time at Manzano, it was no exaggeration to say that Marissa had the potential to win any swim race that she competed in. As a sophomore, she won the 100 yard backstroke at State Swim and Dive Championship. During her junior year, she won the Monarch standout repeated as State Champion in the 100 yd backstroke and was the 100 yard butterfly State Champion. For her senior year, Marissa turned her attention to the freestyle events. She swept the 50 yd and the 100 yd freestyle. With the win in the 50 yd freestyle, she obtained All American Status with a time of 23.74 seconds. Campbell is the only woman prep swimmer to ever win all eight events at the All-City meet -- a feat that took four years because you can only swim in two events each year. She also holds many USSA New Mexico Swim records.

She is currently swimming for UNM. As a freshman, Campbell has smashed UNM's school records in the 100-yard backstroke and the 100-yard freestyle -- records set in 1993 and 1988. Marissa is on track to becoming the first Lobo woman swimmer to make the NCAA meet in more than 20 years.

Max Ortega - Rio Rancho Wrestler

Max Ortega has done something that only 12 wrestlers in State history have done. He won 4 State Championships, beginning since the 8th grade. He finished his junior year in 2008 with a record of 47-0 at 140 pounds, marking the second straight year he went unbeaten.

At the 2009 State 5A Wrestling Championships, Max pinned his opponent and won his 5th state title. He now tied the gold medal record held for a decade by Carlsbad's Michael Scott Owen.

If that wasn't enough, Ortega capped his junior year by winning the National High School Wrestling Championships in March. Max is being courted by college recruiters as much for his ability as his 4.0 grade point average. Ortega may find his toughest challenge of all is picking a college.

Missy Martinez - Cibola High School - Softball

Missy was the anchor for her team as a sophomore and junior. She led the Cougars to their first two State Championships in

school history. In 2008 championship game, she did what she has done many times. Against Carlsbad, she threw her best pitch, the change up, to strike out the batter and win her 2nd consecutive State Softball Championship.

Missy won 29 games in the 2008 season to set a state record. She also has the most career wins (68), according to the NMAA. She still has one more season to add to her marks. Barring injury, there is no doubt that the trend will continue during her senior year. Bad news for her opponents, Martinez is trying to master other pitches.

JR Giddens - UNM - Basketball

JR traveled light years from his troubled 2006-2007 season, leading the Lobos to a 24 victory season. During the 2007 - 2008 season, Giddens led the Lobos in scoring, rebounding & steals. He also was CO Player of the Year for the MWC sharing it with Lee Cummond of BYU.

JR would always guard the opposition's main perimeter scoring threat. Many people credit Coach Steve Alford, for working on Giddens game and attitude. JR had to sacrifice a lot for Coach Alford, but it paid off.

The most exciting moment for JR in 2008 was during the NBA draft. He was a first round draft pick for the Boston Celtics. Being chosen in the first round, guaranteed Giddens a 2 year contract worth 1.6 million dollars.

Award of Distinction

Larry Waters - La Cueva Soccer

Larry has always prided himself on giving 100 percent at all costs. Be it coaching, teaching or administrative work, he always answered the bell when it came to his commitments.

When he realized last summer that he may have been stretched too thin, he decided an adjustment was in order. That's why the winningest high school soccer coach in state history officially stepped aside as La Cueva's boys soccer coach to concentrate on his other duties at the school.

He exits with a 421-113-18 record and seven state championships in stints with Highland and La Cueva. That includes the Class 5A title the Bears won in 2008.

Considering La Cueva's varsity, junior varsity and freshman teams went a combined 49-3-2 this season, Waters admits he's able to exit knowing his program is in outstanding shape.

When you have coaches and players in your program who understand the winning side of things, yes, it is easy to walk away, he said, adding that it's the practices he'll miss the most. The thrill you get from coaching in football, basketball or baseball is the game itself. The drudgery is the weeks and hours of practice. The thrill in soccer is really the practice because that's when you get to teach the sport. In games, a coach has little or no control.

Waters, 62, came to New Mexico from his native Minnesota more than 30 years ago. Not long after that, he found himself as the head coach at Highland.

Of course, back then soccer was barely a blip on the local sports radar. It wasn't officially sanctioned as a sport by the NMAA until 1981, meaning those initial years with the Hornets were in the early stages of soccer's evolution in these parts.

Professional Athlete of the Year

Danny Granger - Indiana Pacers

Danny continues to improve each year while playing for the Indiana Pacers. In 2005 - 2006, Danny averaged 7.5 points and 4.9 rebounds per game, the next year he improved to 13.9 points and 4.6 rebounds per game. During the 2007 - 2008 season, his average rose to 19.6 points and 6.10 rebounds per game.

Larry Bird, general manager of the Indiana Pacers, rewarded Danny with a 6 year contract worth 60 million dollars. The start of the 2008 - 2009 season, Granger's averaging 26.4 points per game to be the 4th leading scorer in the NBA. Danny was recently named to the NBA All-Star team for the 2008-2009 season.

Danny is now giving back to UNM. In 2008 he gave the UNM Athletic Department \$500,000. He also plans on building a Bat-man themed house here in Albuquerque.

HALL OF FAME



Notah Begay III

Notah Begay III was born and raised in Albuquerque and attended Albuquerque Academy where he achieved All-American status by winning the National High School Golf Championships his senior year. He won the City Golf Championships four times; the first when he was only 15 years old. He established a record for the lowest three day round during the City Golf Championships.

He went on to attend Stanford University on a golf scholarship, where he, Tiger Woods and Casey Martin were teammates. Prior to graduating with an economics degree from Stanford, he was a three time NCAA Golf All-American and a member of the 1995 NCAA Stanford Golf Championships team. He set a record by shooting a "62" the second day of the championships and was selected as a team member on the 1995 USA Walker Cup Team.

Begay earned his PGA Tour playing card by finishing in the top 15 on the 1998 NIKE PGA Tour. He is only one of four individuals to shoot a "59" on the PGA Tour. He won the New Mexico Open in 1998.

He is believed to be the first full-blood Native American member of the PGA Tour.



Greg Brown

Greg Brown didn't listen to those that said he was too small to play basketball at the NCAA level. Greg Brown, at 5-foot-7, proved to all the naysayers that there is room for the little man in the game of basketball, especially at the NCAA division I level. Without Brown, the University of New Mexico doesn't come close to winning a WAC title in 1994, the school's first in 16 years.

Praise rang from all over the country as Brown, a 1990 graduate of Albuquerque High School, progressed through his senior year. Four times he scored 30 or more points. Brown tossed in 42 - in 34 minutes - against Texas El Paso. He poured in 34 against New Mexico State. However, he saved his biggest games for BYU.

Brown had 35 in the Lobos win against BYU in the Pit. In the title-clinching victory at Provo, the next-to-last game of the season, Brown was incredible. He had 34 points with 28 of those coming in the second half and overtime of the 84-82 triumph. Brown scored 20 of the Lobos' final 28 points.

For all of his efforts, Brown was named Western Athletic Conference and District 7 Player of the Year. He also received honorable mention All-American status from the United States Basketball Writers and The Sporting News.

Brown received his greatest honor when he was honored with the Frances Pomeroy Naismith Award, given to the nation's top senior college basketball player under 6 foot.

Jim Bradley



Mayfield High School football has one of the strongest and most dominate programs in New Mexico High School sports; Jim Bradley is one of the biggest reasons why the Trojans of Mayfield have established such a winning tradition. He recently retired from the head coaching position only to return as an assistant coach under his son Michael Bradley.

JIM BRADLEY IS A GRADUATE OF LAS CRUCES HIGH SCHOOL AND NEW MEXICO STATE UNIVERSITY.

Jim Bradley has coached football in New Mexico for a total of 46 years. His career coaching record stands at 333-119-9; which includes 23 wins while coaching at New Mexico State University. Bradley holds the record for most wins as a New Mexico high school football coach.

He won seven State Championship titles during his head coaching career and finished as runner up eight times. In 1990, Bradley was inducted into the New Mexico High School Coaches Hall of Honor. He was named National High School Coaches of the Year in 2000 and was inducted into the National Coaches Hall of Fame the same year. During his distinguished career, he was named New Mexico High School Coach of the Year five times.

Charley Johnson



Charles "Charley" Johnson, a former football star at New Mexico State University, played in the NFL for 15 years. A native of Big Spring, Texas, Johnson was named the starting quarterback for the Aggies in 1958, playing for Coach Warren Woodson.

His football career included two consecutive Sun Bowl victories and a perfect 11-0 season in 1960. During the three years Johnson was on the team, the Aggies recorded 23 wins and only nine losses. His jersey, No. 33, is the only number ever retired in more than 105 years of New Mexico State Football.

Johnson graduated from NMSU in the spring of 1961 with a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering. He went on to play quarterback for the St. Louis Cardinals, the Houston Oilers and the Denver Broncos.

While playing football and serving a brief stint in the US Army, Johnson earned his master's degree and doctoral degrees in chemical engineering from Washington University in St. Louis.

After retiring from the NFL in 1975, Johnson helped start several firms and then started his company in 1981. Johnson Compression Services, which closed in 2003, sold and leased gas compressor systems to natural gas pipeline and processing companies in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Louisiana.

Johnson returned to NMSU in 2000 to become the head of the Chemical Engineering Department.
