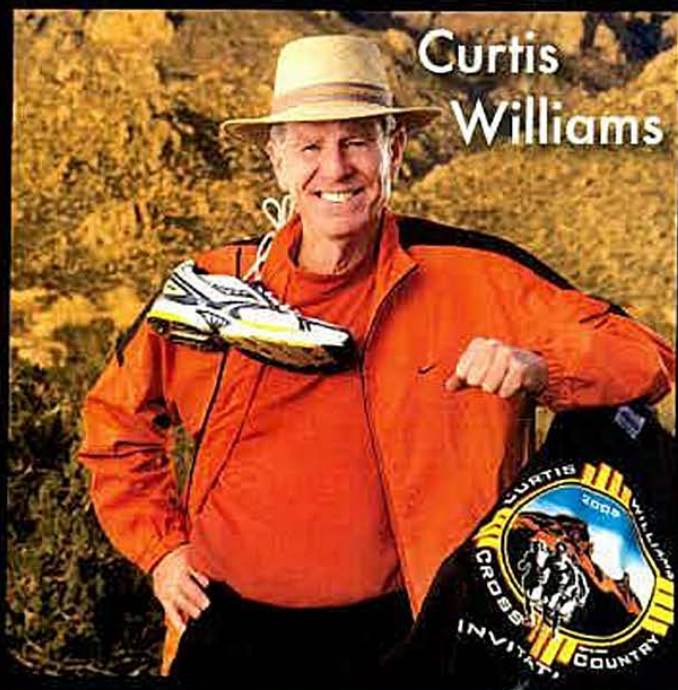
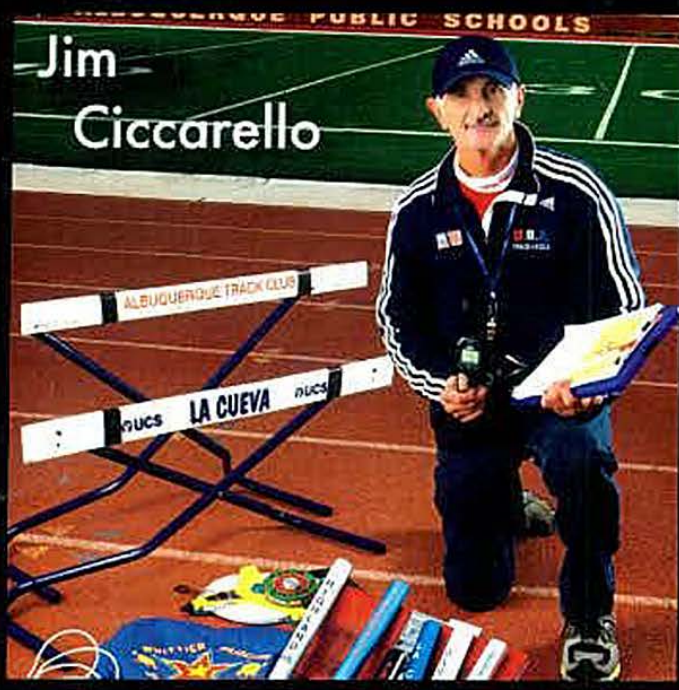


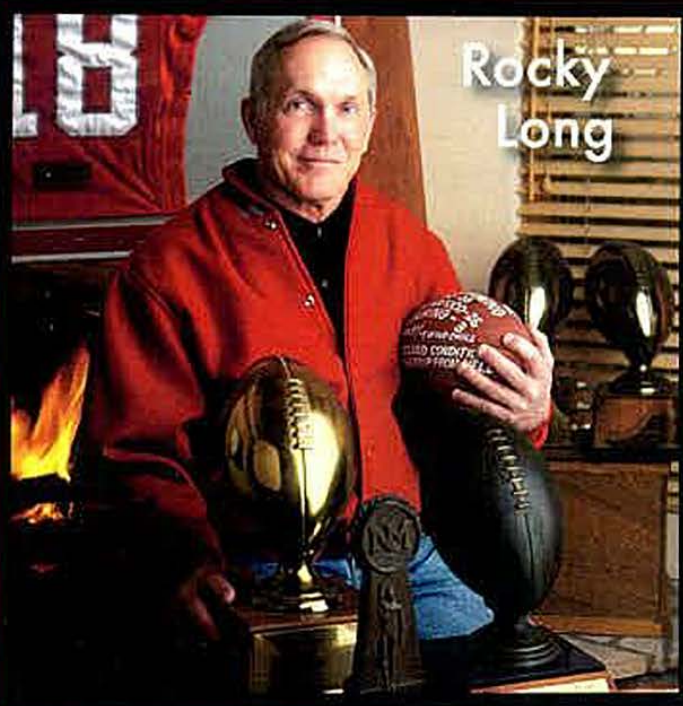

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2010 Award Winners

Female Athletes of the Year

Julia Foster, Albuquerque Academy track and cross country
Julia had an unbelievable season in 2010, turning in the first sub-five-minute mile at the Class 4A state high school track meet in May. Her time (4:58.39) was nearly 10 seconds faster than the 4A record set in 2004. The Charger set another state record, her second in two days, in the 3,200-meter run, (11:01.10), which was 18 seconds better than the previous mark (set in 2007), but less than Foster had hoped for. She had just completed her leg in the medley relay just about 30 minutes before she ran the 3,200. She also was a part of two championship relay teams. Julia earned an invitation to the National Scholastic Indoor Championships in New York City in March, 2010, where she finished second in both the 5,000-meter run and the 2-mile run (10:36). Julia was the 2009-10 Gaborade Girls Track and Field Athlete of the Year for New Mexico.

Anika Newell, Highland High School track and field

Anika surprised everyone at the Class 5A state track & field meet by winning the 300-meter intermediate hurdles and the pole vault; she also placed second in the triple jump, leading the Hornets to their first state championship since 1980, after they edged La Cueva by 4 points. She later surprised everyone by entering the girls' decathlon at the Great Southwest Track and Field Classic, even though she only had a couple weeks to practice for the throwing events. By the time the competition started, she had learned how to do all of the events. Although she scratched twice in the discus and the javelin, she managed to hang in there with a "safe" throw. She knew she would have to pick it up in the events she was good at, and the winner wouldn't be decided until the final event. She trailed a Missouri girl by four points after nine events, but pulled away for the win in the 1,500. Anika finished with 5,015 points -- 269 more points than the runner-up, who had led almost the entire competition.

Male Athletes of the Year

Ronnie Daniels, La Cueva High School three-sport star

Ronnie broke eight all-time state records in football in 2010. He had the most yards rushing in a career (7,068), a single-season rushing record (3,024 yards), single-season rushing touchdowns (42), career rushing scoring record (98 TDs), all-time overall touchdown scoring record (196), all-time points scored (636) and the single-game scoring mark (seven TDs). His Bears teams won two state football championships (2008 and 2009), and two state basketball championships (2009, 2010) during his four years at La Cueva. He will continue his football career in the fall at Texas Tech University.

Lee Emanuel, UNM track & field

Lee became the first Lobo to win back-to-back NCAA indoor track crowns with his win in the men's mile. He also earned Mountain West Conference Student Athlete of the Year honors. To be able to win back-to-back titles in the Indoor Mile is an incredible feat, especially when the racing area is much more restricted on an indoor track than outdoors. He placed sixth in the 1,500-meter run, which was a disappointment to Lee, although he qualified for All American honors.

Darlington Hobson, UNM basketball player

Darlington was named the MWC Player of the Year and the MWC Newcomer of the Year, and earned All-America honors from the Associated Press, Sporting News, Basketball Times, and Fox Sports.com. He was also a finalist for the Wooden award. The team was blessed by this special transfer who was willing to throw his talented 6-foot-7 frame into a team concept while still leading the Lobos in scoring, rebounding and assists. He was the first Lobo to lead the team in all of those categories in the same season. He led a team picked to finish fifth in the conference to the MWC championship, its second in a row.

Teams of the Year

The 2009-10 University of New Mexico men's basketball team. The Lobos were beyond amazing. They rolled out a school-record 30 wins (30-5), and even though they lost their first two conference games, they went on to win their final 14 MWC contests, which left them alone at the top of the standings. UNM soared to a No. 8 national ranking and entered the NCAA Tournament as a No. 3 seed. The team was led by senior Ramon Martinez (13.9 ppg), junior Darlington Hobson (15.9 ppg), and junior Dairese Gary (13.1 ppg), with Hobson and Gary making the All-MWC first team and Martinez making the second team. Among the more important wins last season was a sweep of BYU, including an 83-81 win at the Marriott Center. The Lobos also had a two-point win in overtime against San Diego State and a three-point OT victory over Utah in Salt Lake City.

UNM women's cross country team

The Lady Lobos turned in their best finish at the NCAA Cross Country Championships, where they finished fifth. The women captured the MWC

championship, and the NCAA Mountain Regional championship, which had them ranked fifth before the NCAA championships. UNM had two runners in the lead group of 30-plus, Natalie Gray and Sarah Waldron, who almost made it to the 3k mark with the same time (10:10 and 10:12), and they were essentially given the same split time. As the race progressed, Natalie gave her final kick, which was good for 16th place (20:29), only 24 seconds off the winning time. Sarah finished 33rd overall (20:46). Both earned All America honors. The rest of the team finished strong with a score of 227, with Colorado finishing way back in sixth with a score 314, which shows the Lobos had a big separation from the teams behind them. In 2009, they finished 13th and now, after two years of competing in the national championships, the Lobo women know they can compete with the best in the country.

Coach of the Year

Steve Aflard, UNM men's basketball coach

His 2009-10 season was the winningest season in Lobo history. The 30-5 record, most road wins (10), consecutive conference wins (14), conference road wins (7), and wins over top-25 opponents (5) were all school records. He led the Lobos to their second straight MWC regular season title with a record of 14-2, was named the MWC Coach of the Year for the second season in a row, and was a finalist for the National Coach of the year, and had UNM ranked 6th in the AP poll. The Lobos won their first round game in the NCAA Tournament, beating Montana University, 62-57, before a second-round loss to the University of Washington, 62-64. His 76 wins in his first three seasons are the most by a UNM men's basketball coach.

Professional Athlete of the Year

Arian Foster, Houston Texans running back

Arian Foster, Houston Texans running back: The Texans' second-year RB was the big surprise of the 2010 NFL season. Nobody knew a lot about Foster and he spent most of the 2009 season on the practice squad. He not only surprised everyone in the country, but wound up winning the NFL rushing title with 1,616 yards, the highest single-season total for an undrafted player. He also caught more than 50 passes for 604 yards, which made him as the sixth player in NFL history to reach 1,500 yards rushing and 600 yards receiving in the same year. Foster recently said that although the NFL isn't San Diego as his home town, he tells everyone that Albuquerque will always be his home town -- he has many friends here that he visits annually and has done some community work while he visits.

Promotion of the Year

The U.S. Youth Soccer Far West Regional Soccer Championships. This June event brought together state championship teams from the 14 states in USYS Region IV, as nearly 280 teams descended upon the Albuquerque metropolitan area, including the State Farm Insurance Soccer Complex at Santa Ana, to square off for the right to advance to the national championships. This event was the largest single event held in the region in 2010, as more than 15,000 hotel rooms were consumed in Albuquerque, Rio Rancho and Bernalillo. Youth Soccer Executive Director Jim Tilley, the Albuquerque Convention & Visitors Bureau and the New Mexico Sports Authority played key roles in bringing this event to our area.

Special Recognition

Carol Bairnitz, who earned her 400th career volleyball coaching victory in 2010, is in her 39th year of coaching at Menzanso High School. Bairnitz guided the Monarchs during her entire coaching career, and got that 400th win when her Purple Pride players swept West Mesa (26-16, 25-16, 25-13) on the Mustangs' home court. Carol won a state championship back in 1975, and always has been able to get the most out of the talent she was given. "She used to do the same funny things," Connie Schultz recalled. "Schultz played on that 1975 title team and was quoted in a Feb. 3, 2005, Albuquerque Journal story, "Before the state (matches), she'd have us in a room, thinking about the next game. We went through the championship in our heads." Others honors for Carol were being named the APS Female Sports Coach of the Year (2008-07) and receiving the NMAA Distinguished Service Award (2004).

Ray Birmingham and the UNM baseball team did something that no other UNM baseball team has done since 1982: It qualified for the NCAA Tournament. The Lobos finished in second place in the Mountain West Conference to nationally ranked TCU and finished with a 38-22 season record. The Lobo baseball team went 1-2 at the Fullerton Regional; four Lobos were named first-team All-MWC and five Lobos heard their names called in the MLB draft in June.

Jim Murphy, the Hope Christian School boys basketball coach, reached

a milestone at the Joe Armiijo Classic this past December, beating Valley High School 68-55 for his 600th win with the Huskies. He has been coaching for 29 years, which means he has averaged more than 20 victories a year. Under Coach Murphy, Hope has won nine state championships, and now only the late Ralph Tasker of Hobbs has more basketball championships (12). In the 2009-10 season, Hope Christian lost only one game -- and that was to Class 5A La Cueva -- on a shot at the buzzer. The Huskies certainly don't duck the top teams in 4A and 5A, beating teams like Española Valley, Ektorado, Manzano and Highland in 2009-10, when they also won the APS Tournament. Murphy won Coach of the Year honors in 2004-05 and 2008-08.

Shelby Pendley, a senior at Rio Rancho High School, was honored in 2010 by being named to the USA Junior women's national softball team. She competed in a tryout with the 42 best 16-and-under women in the country. The women were identified by the WNTSC as elite softball players in the appropriate age group. Recommendations for the pool, came from college coaches, high school coaches, and ASA Junior Olympic (JO) coaches. "It was a great experience, going against 42 athletes, all of whom were good," Pendley said. She played shortstop and second base at the tryouts. Pendley said she didn't have a lot of time for entertainment while she was there. "We were with each other the whole time, every meal was at the Olympic Training Center, and all the girls traveled on a charter bus, so it was pretty much all business." At the end of the tryouts, a committee of five members of the USA Softball Women's National Team selected the best 17 young women; Pendley was one of them and obviously excited. Pendley and the Rams finished second in May at the state softball tournament; after she graduates in May, she'll be playing for the University of Arizona Wildcats.

Blake Swihart, a member of the Rio Rancho High School baseball championship team in 2009 and currently a senior at Cleveland High School, had a dream come true when he was recruited and then signed by the University of Texas to play baseball in Austin. The top-notch catcher had another dream come true after he was selected to the USA Baseball National Team. Swihart played catcher and left field for the national team. In August, Swihart played in the nationally televised All-Star All-American game at Petco Park in San Diego, which showcased 38 of the nation's best players in an East vs. West format.

Award of Distinction

Alex Bregman, Albuquerque Academy

A junior at Albuquerque Academy and a member of the USA Baseball 16-and-under team, was named the first high school player ever to win the USA Baseball Richard W. "Dick" Case Player of the Year Award. Bregman, who played second base, hit .564 (22 for 39) with two home runs, 17 RBIs and 17 runs scored in nine games, all wins, and winning the championship for the 16-and-under USA team. Winning the gold medal and winning it with the guys was the most important thing to Bregman, who said, "That was the ultimate goal for me, it was the best feeling I've ever had in my life, running into the dugout knowing that we just won the gold medal." Another great moment for Bregman came in the state baseball tournament in 2009, when, as a freshman, he hit one of just two out-of-the-park homers at Isotopes Park in the state tournament, along the way helping the Chargers win the 4A title.

Michael S. Sanchez, NM State Senator

State Senator Michael S. Sanchez introduced the "Concussion Act," during the 43rd State of New Mexico Legislative Session in 2010; it cleared the legislative process and was enacted into law. The act, which relates to school athletic safety, establishes protocols and educational requirements regarding concussions and other head injuries resulting from athletic activities. This means that the New Mexico Activities Association shall establish protocols and content consistent with current medical knowledge and ensure that appropriate training is conducted. There are many other requirements from the coach, the student, each school district, plus the parents of the students.

Justine Schluntz, Albuquerque Academy alumna

Justine won the NCAA Women of the Year award in 2010 and was a 16-time NCAA All-American swimmer who helped the University of Arizona win the NCAA swimming championships in 2008. A Rhodes Scholar, she was named to the Pac-10's All-Academic swim team for three consecutive seasons. This award is given to a student athlete who has completed her eligibility and demonstrated academic excellence while providing extraordinary community service and leadership. Justine majored in mechanical engineering at Arizona and graduated summa cum laude.

HALL OF FAME



Curtis Williams (HS Cross Country and Track and Field coach)

Curtis Williams began his career in education in 1972 with the Gallup/McKinley County Schools at Gallup Junior High School and Tohatchi High School from 1972-77. In 1979, Curtis assumed the position of head boys and girls cross country coach at Gallup High School and established one of the most dominant cross country programs in the region. His boys teams won 14 state championships and claimed 19 consecutive district championships. His girls teams won 11 state championships and 13 district titles. His overall record included winning an astonishing 92 percent of meets run. Curtis was named the New Mexico High School Coaches Association's Cross Country Coach of the Year eight times and also earned Region 8 Coach of the Year honors five times. He earned his most prestigious honor in 1996 when he was named the National Cross Country Coach of the Year by the National Federation of Interscholastic Coaches.

Throughout his tenure Curtis has been an active member of the NMHSCA and the NMTCCA and has served as president in both organizations. Curtis was inducted into the NMHSCA Hall of Honor in 2003. Before retiring a few years ago Curtis was coaching cross country at Sandia High School. He will never be forgotten in Gallup where the annual Curtis Williams Invitational (cross country) is run each fall. On the day Curtis was formally nominated for induction longtime cross country and track and field coach Matt Henry, also a former UNM track and field coach, termed him "the Globetrotter of cross country in the State of New Mexico."



Jim Ciccarello (APS Track & Field Coach)

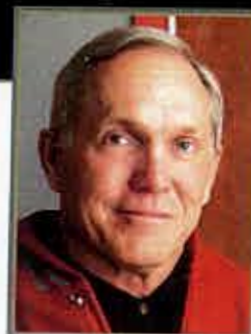
Jim Ciccarello is in his 42nd year of teaching and coaching for Albuquerque Public Schools and has estimated to have taught or coached over 60,000 students. A graduate of Valley High School and the University of New Mexico, Jim has spent his entire career as an elementary school PE teacher and high school track and field coach.

Jim's high school track teams have won six state championships and finished as the runner-up five times. His teams have finished state competition in the top four an astounding 20 times, with four undefeated seasons (1977, 1978, 2000 and 2007).

Jim has received numerous coaching and teaching honors; he has been named the New Mexico Track and Cross Country Association's Coach of the Year four times; was the New Mexico High School Coaches Association's Coach of the Year in 2007; and was the National Federation of High School Coaches' Section 6 Coach of the Year in 2006. He has continually been involved with the track youth in the Albuquerque area, working with the Duke City Dashers and Albuquerque Track Club. He has been instrumental in the coaching and instruction of 20 national age group champions and 150 New Mexico high school individual state champions. Jim has also been the driving force in creating elementary school jump rope teams, including the team he has led at Whittier Elementary for the past 18 years.

THE INDUCTEES

Rocky Long (UNM Football Player/Coach)



Rocky Long came to the University of New Mexico in 1968 as an unheralded recruit and went on to become one of the best-known names in Lobo football history. His accomplishments as a Lobo player are many. Most notably is that he was the only three-time MVP in Lobo football history and a two-time team co-captain. Rocky finished his career as the all-time leading rusher at UNM, a three-time conference all-academic selection and was named the WAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1971. Upon graduation, Rocky played five seasons in the CFL with British Columbia and one season with Detroit in the now defunct WFL. After a brief time as a UNM graduate assistant and two seasons as an assistant coach at Eldorado High School, Rocky became a full-time assistant at UNM in 1978. Prior to his return to UNM in 1997 to become the Lobos' 28th head football coach, he had other collegiate stops at University of Wyoming, TCU, Oregon State and UCLA that established his reputation as an outstanding defensive coach and coordinator. In his 11-year (1997-2008) tenure as the head coach at UNM, Rocky became the career leader in wins by a head coach and compiled seven straight seasons of six wins or more and lead the Lobos to bowl games in 2002 and 2003 (Las Vegas Bowl), 2004 (Emerald Bowl) and the New Mexico Bowl (2006). For the past two seasons (2009-10) Rocky has served as the defensive coordinator at San Diego State University, and was just named Head Coach at San Diego State University in January of 2011.
