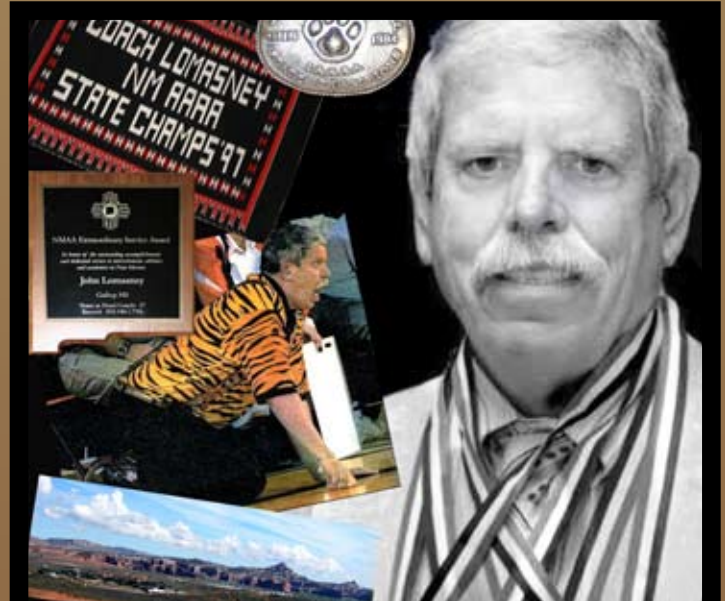

HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

Guy Wimberly – PGA Golf Professional



Guy Wimberly, better known as “Mr. New Mexico Golf”, has spent four-plus decades giving selflessly to the game of golf in Albuquerque, the State of New Mexico and those involved with it. Guy doesn’t just have one talent that he’s used predominantly, rather he is one of the most well-rounded leaders known to the City of Albuquerque, the State of New Mexico, the PGA of America, and the game of golf itself.

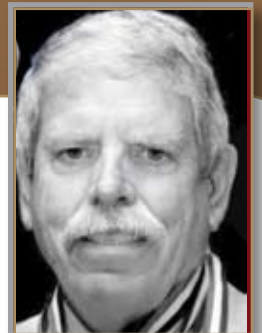
Guy has shown his leadership through governance. He is a founding father of the Sun Country PGA and has held almost every officers’ position on the Sun Country PGA board. He has shown his leadership through example, having won numerous awards at the section level and having been named a national award winner on two occasions. Guy also leads through guidance, education and teaching, having been the “father figure” to many young professionals and amateurs getting into the game of golf. Not only did he teach fellow members and apprentices about industry of golf, but he taught the game of golf itself.

Guy has been recognized by numerous golfing publications and organizations regarding his teaching, playing, promoting or simply the recognition of one of the facilities he has directed (Arroyo del Oso Golf Course, Sierra del Rio Golf Course). He also served on educational committees at the national and section levels. Along with his brother, Herb, Guy helped to establish one of the very first PGA Golf Management programs at New Mexico State University while winning the Horton Smith award at the section and national level.

Guy knows results, having co-created New Mexico Golf Ltd., the multi-million dollar entity that started as one city facility and grew into four public facilities, bringing municipal golf to the general public. His current passion is to market New Mexico as a national golfing destination.

Earlier in 2011, Guy was selected to the PGA Golf Hall of Fame to be inducted and included alongside such names as Nicklaus, Palmer, Hogan, Nelson and Snead.

John Lomasney – Gallup HS Girls’ Basketball Coach



John Lomasney was a pioneer for high school girls basketball in the state of New Mexico. He was instrumental in bringing the Gallup girls basketball program into the New Mexico spotlight and throughout the Navajo Nation.

The results of Coach Lomasney’s efforts have been seen in the tremendous fan following throughout the seasons and the unprecedented attendance of Gallup basketball fans at regular season and state championship events each year. In addition to his service as the head girls’ basketball coach at Gallup HS for 28 seasons (1982-2009), Coach Lomasney was also responsible for creating many community youth basketball camps and leagues.

Coach Lomasney’s legacy begins with his teams’ accomplishments, including an overall record of 503-187, four state championships, 14 district championships and 20 state playoff appearances. He was inducted into the National High School Hall of Fame (2011), and the New Mexico High School Coaches Association Hall of Fame (2006), as well as being selected as the New Mexico, regional, and district coach of the year multiple times.

Coach Lomasney was a teacher of character, to his players and his own children. He remains a well-respected name among his coaching peers; he was known as a fierce competitor, a great host, and a humble winner or loser. Some say they have become better people through their competition with Coach Lomasney. He has earned well-deserved respect among New Mexico high school programs, his fans and his players. Because of that, his legacy will continue to live on and on.

HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES



L.G. & Cooper Henderson – Artesia HS Football Coaches

L.G. Henderson established Artesia as a nationally recognized high school football program that included a No. 6 national ranking in the late 1960s. His organization and style allowed Artesia High School to compete in the New Mexico big-school division and changed high school football in southern New Mexico. L.G.'s teams won five state championships from 1964 to 1969. His six-year, five-title run during this time period included winning streaks of 26 games, 17 games and 16 games. Over the course of his 14-year tenure at Artesia, L.G. amassed 110 wins and a winning percentage of .718.

L.G. remained the all-time winningest coach in Artesia football history until early 2001, when his winning record was eclipsed by his son, Cooper Henderson.

Cooper Henderson's name is synonymous with championships, winning, integrity, fairness, innovation, high-octane offenses and hard work. He started his head football coaching tenure at Ruidoso High in 1985, and spent five seasons in Ruidoso before becoming the head coach of the Artesia Bulldogs.

At the two high schools, Cooper's teams have won an incredible 13 state championships. No other high school football coach in New Mexico has ever won more. He is labeled as a great football mind and known for his innovations – especially on offense. Though coming from a small school, many of his players are statewide leaders in passing, receiving, scoring, and other offensive statistical categories.

According to his peers across the state, though Coach Henderson receives an abundance of recognition for his abilities as a football coach, it is his personal relationships that are the most telling. One coach stated, "He is the total package...he makes you a better man. He is concerned about his boys as players and as students. His focus is to prepare his young men for the next game or for life after the game."

Coach Henderson is a great leader in high school athletics in the state of New Mexico and has served as president of the NMHSCA and on the board of directors of the NMADA.



2011 Award Winners

HIGH SCHOOL TEAM OF THE YEAR

Cleveland Storm Varsity Football

There were only two teams in 5A to be ranked No. 1 this season and they met for the championship down at the Field of Dreams. Mayfield opened the 2011 season in the top spot and Cleveland was No. 1 down the stretch and going into the 2011 state 5A football championship game.

They called it a "Perfect Storm." After Cleveland managed to come back, after trailing 28-14 at halftime, they out-scored the Trojans 34-0 for a 48-28 romp on the Trojans' field.

Cleveland was a strong, dominant team all season, averaging 49 points per game and many of its games were over before the third period ended.

For a team only in its third varsity season, Cleveland has risen to the top of 5A with incredible speed.

This has to be one of the more dominant teams in the history of 5A football.

HIGH SCHOOL COACHES OF THE YEAR

Kirk Potter - Cleveland High School

Potter and the Cleveland Storm had a season to remember. He did something that not many teams have done, rolling over the Mayfield Trojans at the Field of Dreams.

It was not easy by any means, as Cleveland trailed 28-14 at halftime, and then came to beat Mayfield, 48-28.

In only his third year, Coach Potter was quite proud of the team winning the 5A state football championship.

Coach Potter had seven Storm players named All-State, which helped to make this one of the most dominant teams in the history of football ... a team that averaged almost 50 points per game.

Kenny Henry - Cleveland High School

Henry, in just his second year at Cleveland High School, won both the girls and boys state cross country team titles, for the school's first boys' and first girls' school state championships.

What made it so spectacular is they did something that no school has ever done: Not only did they win both team championships, juniors Luis Martinez and Malia Gonzales won the individual state titles, making it a real sweep and ending a very special day.

HIGH SCHOOL FEMALE ATHLETES OF THE YEAR

Sarah Hattis - Cleveland High School

Sarah had a tough decision to make in 2011. She was a top basketball and volleyball player for the Cleveland Storm and being recruited by many schools around the country.

She was ranked the number 6 senior volleyball prospect by prepvolley.com and number 78th senior for basketball by ESPN Hoopgurlz.

For basketball, she visited Purdue, Arizona State, De Paul and Vanderbilt; for volleyball, she visited Florida, Louisville, New Mexico State and Texas. Rarely has a female athlete been this coveted nationally in two sports. Cleveland was ranked No. 1 in the state most of the year in volleyball, but lost to Gadsden for the 5A state championship at Santa Ana Star Center in November.

She finally made her decision, choosing volleyball and the University of Texas.

Ashley Williams - Volcano Vista High School

Volcano Vista High School senior Ashley Williams was the Class 5A "Player of the Year" this season, after leading the Hawks into their second consecutive championship game, which they lost to La Cueva, 1-0.

In her senior season on the pitch, Williams - who is also a standout basketball player in the winter - led 5A in scoring with 35 goals and 15 assists (85 points). She was the Co-Player of the Year in District 1-5A, as well as a first-team member of the All-District team, and then a member of the All-State first team.

In 2010, she led the Hawks to the 5A championship, as they beat La Cueva. She had 12 goals and 8 assists as a junior.

She was also the Gatorade Soccer Player of the Year for 2011.

HIGH SCHOOL MALE ATHLETES OF THE YEAR

Cole Gautsche - Cleveland High School

The 2011 Gatorade Player of the Year had one of the most spectacular high school football seasons in the history of metro football.

The 6-3, 210-pound Gautsche threw for 3,087 yards and 39 touchdowns this season against just four picks; he ran for another 23 touchdowns.

All this adds up to a 5A state championship in Cleveland's third year of varsity competition, capped by a victory over a very good Mayfield team at the Field of Dreams.

Cleveland's 641 points for the season was the most points in a year for any big school program in the history of high school football. They averaged 49 points a game.

Cole will now continue his football career after committing to UNM for his freshman year in 2012.

Luis Martinez - Cleveland High School

Martinez has been the most dominant cross country runner in the state of New Mexico for the 2011 cross country season. He also was the most-dominant long-distance runner as he won both the 1,600- and 3,200-meter races at the N.M. state track and field championships in 2011.

In the fall of 2011, he placed first in the 5,000-meter Lobo Invitational. Six days later, he finished first, with a personal-best of 15:39.22 in the three-mile run at the Socorro Stampede. Luis then won the 5,000-meter race at the Rio Rancho Jamboree. He then won district 1- 5A's individual title for the second time. Next up was the New Mexico state cross country championships, where he again finished first, giving him back-to-back state titles.

After this stellar cross country season, Luis was recognized by Sports Illustrated as one of "Faces in the Crowd" in the November 28, 2011 issue. Later, he was named the Gatorade Cross Country Runner of the Year.

Martinez then participated in the Southwest Nike Cross Country Regionals in Phoenix. He won that race with a time of 15:08.8. Competing in his first Nike High School National Championship, he finished 30th. All this being done as a junior.

Blake Swihart - Cleveland High School

Blake Swihart had a great year in 2011, and being named Gatorade High School Athlete of the Year in baseball was a nice start.

He was drafted by the Boston Red Sox in the first round, the 26th overall pick in June,, making him their highest-drafted catcher since number-14 pick John Marzano in 1984. Swihart signed at the August 15 deadline for \$2.5 million, a franchise record for a position player.

He was also the USA Today's High School First Team All-American catcher in 2011.

Swihart has uncommon offensive potential and athleticism for a catcher. A switch hitter, he handles the bat from his natural right side and has more pull power as a lefty.

COLLEGIATE TEAM OF THE YEAR

UNM Lobo Men's Soccer

What a year for the University of New Mexico men's soccer team. Being ranked No. 1 for four weeks during the 2011 season was pretty impressive.

The Lobos smashed a number of program records this season, including the longest recorded unbeaten streak in program history. The Lobos have now gone 21 games unbeaten.

The UNM men's soccer team set a regular-season attendance figure against UNLV with 5,824 fans and drew a sellout crowd against Duke of 6,200, plus another 300 or more fans that tore down the windscreens in order to watch from the outside of the stadium.

New Mexico claimed the 2011 MPSF Tournament title in Denver. The Lobos defeated San Jose State in the semis and Cal State-Bakersfield team in a shootout, in which they defeated the Roadrunners, 3-1.

The Lobos defeated Duke in the second round of the NCAA tournament, having a bye in the first.

They then had to travel to the University of South Florida, where they eventually lost in a shootout, 6-5, to end a great season.

COLLEGIATE COACH OF THE YEAR

Jeremy Fishbein - UNM

Jeremy Fishbein is in his 10th year at UNM coaching the UNM men's soccer team.

This again was another great year for UNM soccer, as the Lobos went undefeated at 18-0-3 but losing a heartbreaking shootout to the University of South Florida.

What a great year for 2011 for coach Fishbein, breaking attendance records, a record breaking six comebacks during the season and, of course, an undefeated season.

What a success story for coach Fishbein at UNM: He has a 137-44-24 (.727) record, an MPSF Coach of the Year honor in 2002, a Soccer America National Coach of the Year honor in 2004, a MPSF Co-Coach of the Year and a Far West Region Coach of the Year in 2005, a MPSF Co-Coach of the Year honor in 2006 and, again, Coach of the Year in 2011.

2011 Award Winners

COLLEGIATE MALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Carmen Messina – UNM

Messina was not happy that people were calling the UNM Lobos one of the worst defenses in the nation. He definitely was not the cause of that dubious honor. Messina, the nation's leading tackler in 2009 as a sophomore, made the All-MWC first team at linebacker. In his junior season, he made second team, but only because a high ankle sprain slowed him down. In 2011, he was again the dominant linebacker for the Lobos. He was challenged by the coaches to be more of a factor behind the line of scrimmage. He finished with career-best totals of three sacks and 12.5 tackles for losses. He led the MWC in tackles again with 142 tackles and broke the MWC career tackles record, finishing with 454 tackles, also beating former UNM standout Brian Urlacher's tackles record of 442. Urlacher was Messina's boyhood idol. In his final game against nationally ranked Boise State, he had a career-high 21 tackles.

COLLEGIATE FEMALE ATHLETES OF THE YEAR

Kelli Cornell – UNM

Cornell earned Mountain West Defensive Player of the Year honors for the second year in a row. She helped lead the Lobos to their first-ever Mountain West tournament title and the program's first-ever automatic NCAA bid. She also was a member of the Pacific Region Team for 2011.

Jennifer Williams – UNM

Williams earned Mountain West Offensive Player of the Year honors for the second year in a row. She helped lead the Lobos to their first-ever Mountain West tournament title and the program's first ever automatic NCAA bid. She also was a member of the Pacific Region Team for 2011.

PROFESSIONAL ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Jordan Pacheco – Colorado Springs Sky Sox and Colorado Rockies

Pacheco had a September to remember. He got his first call to the majors on September 5, 2011, and the next day he started – at third base, of all places. He got two hits and an RBI in his first game in the majors. He then started games at first base, second, third, and catcher, compiling a solid .286 batting average with two home runs and 14 RBIs in 21 games. Prior to playing professionally, Pacheco attended La Cueva High School and then the University of New Mexico, where he played from 2005-07. In 2005, he hit .408 with 15 HRs and 52 RBIs in 52 games, was a freshman second-team All-American and won All-Mountain West honors. In 2007, he was the MWC Player of the Year. Pacheco played in the minors from 2008-11 with five different Rockies farm teams, making all-star berths in 2009 and 2010.

PROMOTION OF THE YEAR

USA Indoor Track & Field

The USA Indoor Track & Field Championships were held at the Albuquerque Convention Center in 2011 for the second of three consecutive years. The 2011 USA In-

door Championships were televised live on ESPN and were the third and final event of the Indoor Visa Championship Series.

Although the meet saw fewer athletes in a non-world championship year, the competition was still as star-studded as ever, and records were broken.

Jenn Suhr's mark of 4.86/15-11.25 in the Visa women's pole vault broke her own American record, as she went on to win the women's 2011 Indoor Visa Championship Series title. Then another women's record fell when Jillian Camarena-Williams broke the 24-year-old shot put record with her throw of 19.87/65-02.25.

On the men's side, Mike Rodgers won the Men's Indoor Visa Championship title after running to a world leading time of 6.48 seconds in the BMW Men's 60-meter dash.

Jesse Williams defended his title in Albuquerque when he won the high jump with his clearance of 2.28 meters/7-5.75.

2008 Olympian Jennifer Barringer-Simpson pulled ahead of Sara Hall in the last 100 meters to claim her first national indoor title in 9:02.20 for the women's 3,000-meter race, and then Barringer-Simpson picked up a second title on the second day when she won the Nike women's mile. Barringer-Simpson would later go on to win the 2011 Outdoor World Championships in the 1,500 meters.

The men's 3,000-meter race was equally exciting, with Bernard Lagat running away from Galen Rupp to repeat his 2010 U.S. Indoor title.

The Albuquerque Convention and Visitors Bureau, along with the New Mexico Sports Authority, the University of New Mexico, the City of Albuquerque and USATF New Mexico, were the official hosts for the USA Indoor Track & Field Championships, which also returned to Albuquerque in 2012, when the athletes looked forward to making world championship and Olympic teams.

AWARD OF DISTINCTION

Kendra Stern

Kendra Stern is a 2011 Magna Cum Laude graduate of Amherst College, with a double major in Spanish and Art History.

As a senior swimmer at Amherst, Kendra won three individual NCAA Division III championships in the 100, 200 and 500 yard freestyle events, and was honored as:

- The 2011 NCAA Division III National Swimmer of the Year;
- A 2011 first-team Capital One Academic All-America honoree;
- The recipient of the 2011 Honda Women's Collegiate Sports Award for Division III Athlete of the Year; and
- Recently was honored as one of eight student athletes from all NCAA divisions receiving the NCAA Today Top VIII award (previously awarded to the likes of John Elway, David Robinson, and Eli Manning).

Kendra was a 13-time national champion during her four-year career at Amherst. Stern holds NCAA Division III records in the 100-, 200- and 500-yard freestyle events. The 24-time All-American also was named her conference's Swimmer of the Year three times.

Shortly after completing her college career, Kendra qualified for the Olympic Trials in three events, and is training for the Trials, which come up in June.

Gene Pino – New Mexico Activities Association

Pino has been fortunate enough to serve our kids and coaches of New Mexico for the past 35 years (since 1977) in many roles as a teacher, educator, coach, administrator, tournament director, fundraiser and volunteer for many school and youth sport programs.

He has been part of a team of community leaders to help reinstate middle school athletic programs in Albuquerque Public Schools, grow New Mexico AAU Basketball, organize district events, and take the Albuquerque Youth Basketball League to the next organizational and competitive levels.

Pino retired from APS in 2005 as the executive director of the APS Education Foundation. He has remained busy in retirement working part-time as an assistant director at the New Mexico Activities Association, where he helps organize "first class" state competitions and tournaments for our students and coaches of New Mexico.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

Jenna Thurman and Jackson Thomas – Del Norte Cross-Country

These individuals did something this season that no other school has done in New Mexico. They both won city, district and state in the same season from the same school. This is a first for New Mexico.

Jenna Thurman: Undeclared all season; city, district, and state champion. Set two course records along the way. She had the fastest time in state out of all divisions. She maintains a 4.0 GPA as a junior and is third in her class. Jenna won the Gatorade Female Cross Country Runner Award for New Mexico. She is also a two-sport athlete, playing soccer each fall during cross country season. She is also Del Norte's first girls' cross country state champion.

Jackson Thomas: Lost only one race during the season; city, district, and state champion. Set two course records along the way. Jackson competed at the Nike Regional race in Phoenix, where he qualified to the Nike national meet in Portland, Oregon. He also qualified to run in the Wings of America Jr. Nationals in St. Louis, Missouri. Jackson just started running as a junior.

Frank Castillo – La Cueva High School

Frank Castillo has coached varsity basketball for 38 years -- 12 at Cibola and 26 at La Cueva. In those years, he has won five state championships, had five state runners-up, plus three third-place finishes, 19 district championships, and his teams have made 25 state tournament appearances. Castillo is in the NMH-GSA Hall of Honor and the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Hall of Fame. In 2011, he won his 600th game against, of all teams, Cibola, where his career began. At the time of this publication, he has 618 wins and is second in career wins within the APS family.
